




Munich 2024



Munich Trip

Forty students from Years 10 and 11 were given the fantastic opportunity to visit the German city of Munich in October. The popular trip was organised by the History department, in relation to the GCSE topic of 'Germany 1918-39'. The focus was on the rise of the Nazi party, and the importance of the Munich Putsch (which was an attempt by Hitler to seize power in 1923).

The three day trip included loads of fascinating historical visits, including the site where the Nazi party was founded, where they started their attempted revolution, and Dachau concentration camp. We are sharing the favourite moments from Lexie and Piper (Year 11).

Lexie: I really enjoyed going to Dachau concentration camp, because I found it very informative and interesting - despite being quite upsetting. I found it very useful as we weren't only being taught about the Nazis' racial policies, we were also able to see what we were learning. The huts in which the prisoners were kept, and the awful conditions they endured were bad enough, but then we saw the gas chamber and the furnaces.

On the first day we walked the route of the Munich Putsch, which was quite tiring, but we learnt how far they marched and where Hitler escaped after being shot at. The various beer halls were interesting to see, and to imagine what it must have been like in the 1920s and 30s - when Hitler was making speeches.

Piper: My time in Munich was not only informative but it also allowed us to have some time with friends in a different environment. The visit to Nuremberg, to see the rally grounds, was good because not only did it give us a visual idea of how loud Hitler must have needed to be, but it also gave us an understanding of how persuasive he was, and how popular he was (as the areas were huge).


On the second evening we went bowling, which gave us the chance to get back into our normal friendship groups.

Bowling itself was fun, but we also had the chance to discuss what we had just eaten for dinner! This had been a traditional Bavarian dish (of roast pork and potato dumpling), which wasn't quite everyone's favourite meal! Overall, for me the best thing about the trip was seeing a different culture whilst being in the company of my friends.

Thank you to both girls for sharing their thoughts. The trip was a great success; all of the students learned a lot, and had an incredible cultural experience. They were a delightful group to take on a trip.

News from Term 1

The Excellence Programme has had a busy and very productive first term! Prospective students underwent a vigorous application process including a written letter and an interview process led by the Year 10 student leaders in the hope of gaining a place within the excellence programme. Miss Best was very impressed with the courage and dedication of all the pupils who underwent this process and found it extremely difficult to make a final decision on who should gain a place within the programme due to the quantity and quality of this year's applications. However, after deliberating for a long time the final 38 students were selected and officially welcomed onto the programme as the class of 2024-25.

The 38 successful candidates completed a welcome session working on interpersonal skills of teamwork and problem-solving skills.

Most recently they have been working towards a GW first aid certificate learning how to administer vital care for themselves and others. They have learnt how to use EpiPens, bandage wounds, the recovery position, burns and lots more!

Miss Best has been very impressed with their questions and interest within the course and looks forward to awarding them with their certificate just after the Christmas break. Keep up the great work GW!

Eco Club Tree Planting



Science Lecture


Students and parents joined us in the Jon Egging hall for an evening of science. This year's science lecture was themed on space. We looked at the scale of the solar system and elements that make up our universe. Using a Bunsen burner we lit various solutions of metal containing compounds to see the spectrum of light they emit. Mr White then calculated the energy needed to escape Earth's gravity and we used some "rocket fuel" to show how we can propel ourselves. The final few demonstrations revealed the dangers of space travel in relation to temperature, the vacuum of space and radiation.




Arts



Glenmoor Football Academy

We launched the Glenmoor Football Academy (GFA) in September 2024, giving students in Year 8 and 9 an opportunity to gain a higher level of football coaching to help build on the success of our two teams. This was a chance to treat the students like academy players at professional clubs, and provide an environment where training, physical exercise and increased tactical knowledge are accessed.

The GFA has also given our students the chance to increase leadership skills, with the Year 9 squad ready to enrol on our Football Academy Mentorship Programme where they will be paired with a student from the Year 7 football team and support them through their first year at the academies. We are also very much looking forward 2025 where we will attend special events and sessions put on by Brockenhurst College and AFC Bournemouth community projects.

We train four mornings a week, working on patterns of play within a tactical framework. A key focus this term has been on strength and conditioning where students have been doing extra intervention lessons in the gym or on the training pitch with the intent that, in key moments in games, we are stronger and better equipped to succeed. The Year 8 and 9s have come together to form a brand-new bespoke form tutor group and it has been wonderful to see them support each other on and off the pitch. One of our targets for the girls this year was to not only uphold the GW values of integrity, courage and compassion, but to have accountability for their performances in training, to be coachable, to have the hunger and determination to want to improve. They have done this in abundance, and it has been Miss Fraser's and my pleasure to work with these incredible young women.

The increase in training has led to an even higher standard on the pitch where the girls shone across both year groups. Year 8 have continued building on what was an impressive year last year performing wonderfully. They are currently having a wonderful run in the National Cup and are now in the last 32 in the country with a great chance of making the last 16. At the time of writing, we are due to play Kennet School from Newbury in an away tie. Should they progress, they will have reached the furthest in the competition, that we can recall, of any girls team at Glenmoor.

The Year 9 team have also continued their road to glory. Despite an unfortunate defeat in the National Cup, where they dominated the game, and did everything but score, they have not let that result deter them. Instead, they remain on a quest to become the first ever three-peat County Cup winners, something which has never been done before. Winning the trophy in Year 7 & Year 8, they are more determined than ever to complete this amazing accomplishment and are showing signs that they might just achieve an historic third County Cup win in a row.


