The examinations

GCSE English Language Paper 1 (1 hour 45 minutes)

Section A of this paper tests reading and analysis skills and requires students to read **one fiction extract**.

It contains 4 questions:

- 1. Find 4 things in the text
- 2. Analyse language
- 3. Analyse structure
- 4. Evaluate a statement about the text

Section B of this paper tests students' creative writing skills:

5. They will be asked to write a narrative or a description. An image will be provided which students can use as a prompt for their writing.

Topics to be covered in the exam:

- Recognising word classes
- Commenting on the effect of language
- Recognising structural techniques
- Commenting on the effect of structure
- Evaluating a writer's use of language and structure
- Recognising genre of texts

Writing:

- Using descriptive techniques
- Using structural techniques
- Grammatical rules
- Ambitious vocabulary
- Imitating different styles, genres and formats of writing

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The examinations

Literature Paper Combined – Modern Text and 19th Century fiction only (1 hour 45 minutes) In Section A, students will be required to answer <u>one</u> question on <u>'An Inspector Calls' by JB</u> **Priestley.**

- There will be a choice of two questions. Only one must be answered.
- The question will be character or theme related
- They're expected to write about the play as a whole

Topics to be covered:

- 'An Inspector Calls' plot
- 'An Inspector Calls' characters
- Key quotations
- Themes

Assessment based on:

- Knowledge of the text
- Analysis of language and structure
- Awareness of context and writer's purpose
- Marks available for writing accuracy

In section B, students will be required to answer <u>one</u> question on <u>'A Christmas Carol' by Charles</u> <u>Dickens.</u>

- They'll be given an extract from 'A Christmas Carol'
- The question will be character or theme related
- They're expected to write about the extract and the novella as a whole

Topics to be covered:

- 'A Christmas Carol' plot
- 'A Christmas Carol' characters
- Key quotations
- Themes

Assessment based on:

- Knowledge of the text
- Analysis of language and structure
- Awareness of context and writer's purpose

The examinations

Students will sit two mathematics papers, one non calculator and one calculator. Students will either sit Higher or Foundation papers. Each exam will be 1 hour 30 minutes long.

The examinations

Component 1 paper: Each section has a 2, 5, 8 and 15 mark question.

2 hours long, suggested 30 minutes on each section.

Candidates will study the following four themes. All questions are compulsory.

Theme 1: Issues of Relationships

Theme 2: Issues of Life and Death *must include a Humanist perspective in the 15 mark question*

Theme 3: Issues of Good and Evil Theme 4: Issues of Human Rights

This component will be assessed by questions focusing on knowledge, understanding and evaluation of the identified themes.

Students will be expected to demonstrate an understanding of the influence of religion and worldviews on individuals, communities and societies, as well as to be expected to support their responses using appropriate knowledge and understanding of key sources of wisdom and sacred texts.

The examinations

Students will complete a full paper on Medicine Through Time c.1250-Present. The exam will last for 1hour 20 minutes. The exam will focus on medical changes and continuities through different time periods of history as well as assessing knowledge on the trenches, injuries and treatments of WW1.

Topics to be covered in the exam:

- Medicine in Medieval England (1250-1500)
- Medicine in Renaissance England (1500-1700)
- Medicine in the Enlightenment (1700-1900)
- Medicine in Modern Britain (1900-Present)
- The British sector of the Western Front

Wellbeing tips for revision


Looking after your wellbeing can have a positive impact on how well you do in your exams.

Below are five simple things to bear in mind during revision:

1. Not all stress is bad:

The **right amount of stress can motivate** you to get revision done. It can be important to **recognise when stress has tipped over** from becoming a motivating force to an overwhelming emotion.

Signs of overwhelming stress vary, but common signs are feeling irritable, feeling overwhelmed, difficulty concentrating, raised heartrate and breathing. If you feel your stress is overwhelming, take a **break** and **speak** to someone about how you are feeling.





2. Sleep is your friend!

If you sleep well (8-10 hours per night) you are scientifically proven to retain more of what you are studying and concentrate better.

Try to maintain a **consistent getting up time** and allow yourself **30 minutes** to unwind before you plan to go to sleep.

3. 30-minute study rule:

No-one can study for six-hours straight without a break. Trying to do so will increase your stress unnecessarily. Break up your time into **30-minute chunks** to be most effective. Take **micro-breaks** after every 30 minutes: stand up, check your phone, listen to a song, get some food.





4. Talk about exam nerves:

Feeling stressed and a little anxious about exams is normal. **Talk** to a friend or parent and share how you are feeling. You might feel better having spoken to someone.

5. Breaks = GOOD. Constant distraction = BAD:

Taking **planned breaks** is great and will help you remain on task but checking your social media every 5 minutes is a sure-fire study fail and might increase your feelings of stress unnecessarily. Research shows that it can take up to 20 minutes to refocus on a task when you've been unnecessarily distracted.
