# **Mathematics**

Students will sit one calculator and one non-calculator exam. The non-calculator paper is 45 minutes long and the calculator paper is 1 hour long. Both exams will assess the knowledge students have obtained from the first term of study, as well as their general mathematical skills.

Students are advised to revise the following topics using the independent learning page on Sparx Maths. They will also find it useful to revise the content in their knowledge organiser.

# **English**

Students will sit one exam. Students will have 75 minutes in length to complete two sections. The first section is based on their study of *Richard III* where they will answer a series of multiple choice and inference-based questions after reading an extract they have studied. They will then also be required to answer a longer response question based on the extract. The second section is based on gothic creative writing which will require them to write a story or a description in the gothic style.

#### Topics to be covered in the exam:

#### Question 1: Reading

- Knowledge of the plot and characters in the play.
- Identifying writers' methods
- Commenting on the effect of writers' methods
- Being able to make inferences about quotations.
- Using subject terminology specific to genre and writers' intent

### Question 2: Writing

- Using language and structural techniques for effect
- Using a range of sentence types
- · Using narrative structures
- Spelling, punctuation, and grammar rules
- Range of vocabulary
- Imitating the gothic style genre e.g. tension, suspense, setting, characters

The questions will require students to state facts, explain scientific concepts and analyse graphs or tables. There will a variety of short answer questions and long answer questions that will require an extended answer. Some simple mathematical calculations may also be included.

Students will sit one 45-minute exam in which they will answer the following types of questions:

- Section A is knowledge based. Students will be given multiple choice questions and closed questions. There will also be a chronology task.
- Section B is based on analysing historical sources and interpretations.
- Section C is extended writing. Students will need to:
  - Describe two characteristics of something;
  - Explain one reason for a historical event taking place
  - Give an argument as to whether they agree or disagree with a set statement.

### Main topics to be covered in the exam:

### The Tudors (Autumn 1)

- criticisms of the Catholic Church and Martin Luther,
- · reasons for Henry VIII breaking with Rome,
- religious changes during the reigns of Edward VI, Mary I and Elizabeth I,
- challenges Elizabeth I faced during her reign,
- life in Elizabethan England
- Elizabethan exploration.

### England: A World Turned Upside Down 1603-1707

- religious challenge faced by James I,
- · causes of the English Civil War,
- events of the English Civil War,
- Witchcraft in 1600s,
- Charles I's execution,
- the Interregnum,
- Restoration of the English Monarchy.

### Skills required:

In each section you will be asked

**MCQs**- lots of 1 mark multiple choice questions- simply circle the correct option

**DEFINE-** 2 mark questions which asks that you define a key word, and give an example if necessary.

**DESCRIBE-** 3 mark questions.

- One paragraph needed
- Write in a coherent way (using discourse markers)
- Use a variety of key words, examples and teachings if possible
- Keep it direct and relevant to the question

**EXPLAIN**- 4 mark questions (PEE)

- Two paragraphs
- Fully explaining each point, linking back to the specific words in the question.
- Using sources of wisdom eg.
  Qur'an, Hadith, Muhammed, Final
  Sermon
- Explain the impact or influence of the beliefs/practices on Muslims (consider how they think/act/feel.







# Geography

Students will sit one exam. Students will have 60 minutes in length to complete questions. Section A will on the population unit that students studied at the beginning of year 8. In section A there will be a range of 1,2, 4 mark questions and one extended 5 mark question. Section B will assess students understanding of the year 8 coasts unit. In Section B there will be a range of 1,2,3,4-mark questions and one extended 5 mark question.

### Topics to be covered in the exam:

#### Topic : Population

- Where do people live and why
- What causes populations to grow or decline and impacts of this
- Factors that will change birth and death rates
- Aging populations- causes, impacts and management
- Youthful populations- causes, impacts and management
- Types of migration and reasons people migrate
- Case study of migration (India to the UK)
  - Causes (push and pull factors)
  - Impacts (positives and negatives for both countries)

### Topic 2: Coasts

- Key processes found along the coastwaves, weathering and erosion
- Formation of headlands and bays
- Formation of caves, arches, stacks and stumps
- Formation of beaches through longshore drift

### Wellbeing tips for revision

Looking after your wellbeing can have a positive impact on how well you do in your exams.

Below are five simple things to bear in mind during revision:

### 1. Not all stress is bad:

The **right amount of stress can motivate** you to get revision done. It can be important to **recognise when stress has tipped over** from becoming a motivating force to an overwhelming emotion.

Signs of overwhelming stress very, but common signs <u>are:</u> feeling irritable, feeling overwhelmed, difficulty concentrating, raised heartrate and breathing. If you feel your stress is overwhelming, take a **break** and **speak** to someone about how you are feeling.





### Sleep is your friend!

If you sleep well (8-10 hours per night) you are scientifically proven to retain more of what you are studying and concentrate better.

Try to maintain a **consistent getting up time** and allow yourself **30 minutes** to unwind before you plan to go to sleep.

### 30-minute study rule:

No-one can study for six-hours straight without a break. Trying to do so will increase your stress unnecessarily. Break up your time into 30-minute chunks to be most effective. Take micro-breaks after every 30 minutes: stand up, check your phone, listen to a song, get some food.





### Talk about exam nerves:

Feeling stressed and a little anxious about exams is normal. Talk to a friend or parent and share how you are feeling. You might feel better having spoken to someone.

### Breaks = GOOD. Constant distraction = BAD:

Taking **planned breaks** is great and will help you remain on task but checking your social media every 5 minutes is a sure-fire study fail and might increase your feelings of stress unnecessarily. Research shows that it can take up to 20 minutes to refocus on a task when you've bee unnecessarily distracted.
