The examinations:

For English Language, students will sit two examinations, both 1 hour 45 minutes in length, which will assess their reading and writing ability.

English Language Paper 1 (1 hour 45 minutes)

Section A of this paper tests reading and analysis skills and requires students to read one fiction extract. It contains 4 questions:

1. 4 multiple choice comprehension questions
2. Analyse language
3. Analyse structure
4. Evaluate a statement about the text

Section B of this paper tests students' creative writing skills. They will be asked to write a narrative or a description based on an image or written prompt.

English Language Paper 2 (1 hour 45 minutes)

Section A of this paper tests reading and analysis skills and requires students to read 2 non-fiction extracts – one from the 19th century. It contains 4 questions:

1. Identify the 4 true statements
2. Comparison and inference
3. Analyse language
4. Compare viewpoints

Section B of this paper tests students' ability to write non-fiction. They will be required to write a newspaper article, letter, speech, leaflet or essay.

The examinations:

Students will sit two papers.

Literature Paper 1: 1 hour 45 minutes

- One question on Shakespeare with an extract (Macbeth)
- One question on 19th Century Literature with an extract (A Christmas Carol)

Topics to be covered in literature paper 1:

- Plot, characters and themes from Macbeth and A Christmas Carol.
- Quotes and ideas from Macbeth and A Christmas Carol.
- Contextual information about the Jacobean (Macbeth) and Victorian (A Christmas Carol) periods.
- Play – understanding terminology and methods
- Novel – understanding terminology and methods
- Students will need to comment on the effect of language and structural methods in each text

Literature Paper 2: 2 hours 15 mins

- One question on modern prose with no extract (An Inspector Calls)
- One question on poems already studied (from the Power and Conflict Poetry)
- Two questions on Unseen poetry (poems not studied before). One essay on a singular poem, one question on a comparison.

Topics to be covered in literature paper 2:

- Plot, characters, quotes and themes of An Inspector Calls.
- Contextual information about the Edwardian era and post WW2.
- Key ideas, quotes, and themes from all 15 poems in the Power and Conflict poetry anthology
- Poetic terminology and methods
- Students will need to be able to comment on the effect of language and structure within all the texts.

The examinations

All students will sit three Higher or Foundation tier examinations depending on their set. Sets 1-4 will sit the Higher tier examinations and sets 5-8 will sit the Foundation tier. The three examination papers are structured as follows:

- Paper 1 Non Calculator - (1hr 30minutes)
- Paper 2 Calculator - (1hr 30minutes)
- Paper 3 Calculator - (1hr 30minutes)

All 3 papers cover mixed content and so topics can appear on any of the papers. Topics can be tested on more than one paper so if a topic has been covered on an earlier paper it could also come up in a later one.

The examinations

Students will sit three GCSE papers covering Biology, Chemistry and Physics paper 1 content in individual papers and a fourth with a mix of Biology, Chemistry and Physics paper 2 content. The papers are **1 hr 15 mins** each (combined science) or **1 hr 45 mins** each (separate sciences).

Wellbeing tips for revision


Looking after your wellbeing can have a positive impact on how well you do in your exams.

Below are five simple things to bear in mind during revision:

1. Not all stress is bad:

The **right amount of stress** can motivate you to get revision done. It can be important to **recognise when stress has tipped over** from becoming a motivating force to an overwhelming emotion.

Signs of overwhelming stress vary, but common signs are feeling irritable, feeling overwhelmed, difficulty concentrating, raised heartrate and breathing. If you feel your stress is overwhelming, take a **break** and **speak** to someone about how you are feeling.



2. Sleep is your friend!


If you sleep well (**8-10 hours** per night) you are scientifically proven to **retain more** of what you are studying and **concentrate** better.

Try to maintain a **consistent getting up time** and allow yourself 30 minutes to unwind before you plan to go to sleep.



3. 30-minute study rule:

No-one can study for six-hours straight without a break. Trying to do so will increase your stress unnecessarily. Break up your time into **30-minute chunks** to be most effective. Take **micro-breaks** after every 30 minutes: stand up, check your phone, listen to a song, get some food.



4. Talk about exam nerves:

Feeling stressed and a little anxious about exams is normal. **Talk** to a friend or parent and share how you are feeling. You might feel better having spoken to someone.

5. Breaks = GOOD. Constant distraction = BAD:

Taking **planned breaks** is great and will help you remain on task but checking your social media every 5 minutes is a sure-fire study fail and might increase your feelings of stress unnecessarily. Research shows that it can take up to 20 minutes to refocus on a task when you've been unnecessarily distracted.
